SORRY is an archive-based artwork of the mouths of public figures apologising – religious leaders, sports stars, CEOs, politicians and other public figures – all taken from newspaper and online news sources. Each time I show this work, I make it site-specific. For this occasion at Emerson Gallery on Schiffbauerdamm, a few minutes away from the Reichstag, I selected public apologies of politicians. I then added an image of President Barack Obama apologizing to the Chancellor Angela Merkel for the CIA eavesdropping on her cell phone (2014) and President Joachim Gauck for police and intelligence services' apparent inability to solve the murders of Turkish and Greek immigrants (2013). I see public apologies as symptomatic of this time of the insatiable appetite for emotionally-charged news. They act as fodder for the multi-channel newsworld while at the same time they may be historically very important.
